ARRL President Pep Talk at 2024 NADXC Banquet

I was glad that Fred Kepner, K3FRK, Publisher of the LongPath Newsletter for the North Alabama DX Club (NADXC) asked that I send out a message in an attempt to have club members share their experience at the 2024 Huntsville Hamfest and/or NADXC Banquet by writing an article for this month's newsletter. Since having had the privilege to speak with the President of the American Radio Relay League (ARRL), Mr. Rick Roderick, K5UR at both the Huntsville Hamfest and NADXC DX Banquet, I wanted to share our distinguished guest's insights to our membership, based on some of my pressing concerns conveyed to him.

On Saturday morning, 17 August 2024, just after the Huntsville Hamfest doors opened, I found myself with a little time to find the ARRL booth. I quickly made a beeline to the ARRL booth as the crowds rushed into the South Hall of the Von Braun Civic Center. I met Mr. Roderick once again, after having met him at other hamfests in the past. I began touching on some concerning comments that I had heard from other ham radio

operators in the area regarding the ARRL. After some discussion and explanation regarding four or five subjects that I had discussed with him that morning, I asked if he could bring one up at the NADXC DX Banquet later Saturday night at the Signals Museum of Information Explosion. I asked if he would give the banquet attendees about three to five minutes on any of the subjects we just discussed. In a very polite manner, he asked if he could think about it and would find a topic that he felt comfortable to speak about. So, I left him with his choice of topics, unknowing which he would surely discuss, since all of the subjects could be considered highly controversial.

Later that night at the banquet, I was surprised that he had selected a blend of a few topics affecting the League that we discussed earlier that morning, to include a highly controversial topic which was about the recent ARRL hack affecting many ARRL online systems and especially Logbook of the World (LOTW). He explained that it was a ransom attack and that the League personnel were held to silence by the FBI until a point in

time that it was deemed safe to openly discuss. Unfortunately, the League had to pay to obtain a "key" to get their systems back. By this, I mean to unlock all of the software locked by the hackers. Mr. Roderick, being an active DXer himself, truly wanted to see LOTW get back online and operational. Many of us DXers missed LOTW for a couple of months, but I am glad to say that LOTW is now partially operational, at least to the point where DXers can upload their logs. Mr. Roderick said that some ARRL systems were unaffected, but more time was needed to verify that their IT professionals had the League online systems fully protected to bring all of the systems back online and integrated together.

As he spoke, Mr. Roderick challenged DXers to be loyal to the ARRL. He indicated one could be a quitter, that is, leave the League without renewing their membership, but that was not the correct things to do. DXers should set an example to other hams to support whatever the League has to offer to ham radio operators and stand by the League, especially by renewing their League membership.

Mr. Roderick challenged those in attendance to be a mentor. He challenged the attendees to help and encourage younger people to study and obtain their amateur radio license. This would bring young folks into the hobby to keep it going as the older generations are passing away faster than one would think. He challenged us to show our stations to young people who might be interested, such as school age youth. He, himself, became interested in the hobby at the age of five years old when a neighbor showed him his station and after watching him making QSOs on the air.

It was also nice to be able to sit at the same table with Mr. Roderick during the DX Banquet and to meet his lovely wife, Holly. She kept us all captivated with things that the two of them had experienced visiting other countries in the past. As I left the very successful banquet, I was glad that the President of the ARRL gave us all a pep talk. As he pointed out, we all can see how many members in the hobby are Technician class, 2-meter repeater type of hams. I, along with Mr. Roderick, encourage us all to reach out to a ham radio club in your area or community and make an attempt to help those wanting to get into the hobby or those Technician-type, 2-meter repeater amateur radio operators to spread their horizons and get them interested in DXing, contesting, satellite & EME operations, RTTY, emergency communications, and other facets of the hobby. It is up to us to encourage current hams and "wanna-be" hams to get into the hobby, otherwise our hobby will decline in number and interest. I reiterate Mr. Roderick, "we all can and should do our part to help the hobby grow."



It's over and done now, folks. For those who attended, WOW. We put on a show. We had good attendance from the ARRL folks, tons of door prizes, and a great DXpedition presentation.

So now I'm reduced to arithmetic and statistics. I pay attention to the budget on the previous page. It tells me some interesting things:

- We expected \$1,150 in dues, but we've only received \$574. That's less than half. I attribute that to our aging membership. Fred keeps our online membership list pretty accurate. You can readily see there what has happened. The folks who attend meetings have paid their dues. The ones who haven't paid haven't been to meetings in the last year. As Rick Roderick said during the banquet, we desperately need younger members, and it's our duty to find them.
- Membership dues are a small part of our budget. We rely more and more on donations, unfortunately from SK estates, but also from the Hamfest committee. And it sure helps if the Banquet can finish out in the black.
- DX Banquets at Hamfest have always been our biggest effort of the year, and have typically fallen just short of "break-even." As you can see on the budget breakdown, I had planned to lose about \$170 on the venture. But we actually made about \$479 on it. Of course there are reasons, and if you were involved, you are certainly aware: the extra raffle tickets, the lower cost location, and the larger attendance.
- Banquet attendance always eludes me. The museum can barely hold 100 people. Last year we sold 99 tickets and I ordered 99 meals, but only 91 showed up. This year we

- In the end we spent \$4,172 in order to take in \$4,690, so our profit was \$479. Other things I'd like to note with pride: Bruce and Fred put a lot of effort into making the show go smoothly, especially in distributing the door prizes. This had been a small disaster in the past when teams weren't set up logically in advance. I'd also like to thank Steve Werner for collecting so many door prizes from the Hamfest vendors. If you haven't seen this before, you're really missing something special! Congrats, guys!

I need feedback from you. I go to 2-3 banquets at the Hamvention every year. They have bars there and usually charge \$6 for a beer. We don't have a liquor license, so we can't sell it here, but we can give it away. So it's free. I bought a lot less beer this year, but we still had a bunch left. I thought this would be an incentive to come, but it might not work that well for the local population. Does that affect the demand for banquet tickets? Let me know.

North Alabama DX Club (NADXC) "Club Fact Sheet"

Who We Are: NADXC is a group of active radio amateurs with a deep compassion for working DX, contesting, and other aspects of Amateur Radio. We welcome everyone who is interested in joining our club. NADXC members are active in all facets of DX and contesting. The NADXC also donates funding for various DXpeditions all over the world. The NADXC sponsors a DX Banquet in mid-August of every year in conjunction with the Huntsville Hamfest in Huntsville, Alabama. NADXC members moderate various programs at club meetings and during the Huntsville Hamfest, covering amateur radio technical and operating topics for all to learn and enjoy. The NADXC sponsors a prestigious award at the end of year for the most deserving DXer of the Year from the NADXC club.

DX Funding Policy: The policy supports major DX peditions that meet our requirements for financial sponsorship. Details are available on the NADXC website and in the "Longpath" newsletter.

Club History: The NADXC was organized in December 1966 by a group of 12 charter members. The original constitution was adopted and signed on December 19, 1966. The first chairman was Dan Whitsett, W4BRE (SK). In the early-1970's, the NADXC was custodian of the W4, K4 QSL Bureau which became such a huge undertaking that it eventually was passed to other larger clubs. In January of 1977, the club bought a VHF repeater for sharing DX spots and hosting a weekly net on Wednesday nights. The repeater was located on Redstone Arsenal, Weeden Mountain using the frequencies of 147.91/147.31 MHz on two meters. Today, the repeater has been relocated and utilizes the frequencies of 147.90/147.30 MHz, with a callsign of W4QB. The weekly net has been discontinued. In 1980, the club started the monthly newsletter known as the "Longpath" which currently continues to be produced every month.

While organized as a DX club, NADXC members are active in all aspects of the hobby. We trust that this information will be of interest to all and hope all hams have a long and pleasant association with the NADXC.

Requirements for Membership: The NADXC welcomes all hams radio operators who have an interest in DXing. It does not matter whether you are a new ham, a seasoned ham operator, an old-timer to DXing, or a ham who has just been hit with the DX bug; everyone is welcome! See the club website: www.nadxc.org. Dues are paid in January of every year.

Meetings: The NADX club meets the second Tuesday night of every month, with the current location at the Signals Museum of Information Explosion (MIE) located at 1806 University Drive, Huntsville, Alabama and virtually via Zoom. Some members gather early to eat their dinner, socialize, discuss DX worked, and then we have a short business meeting starting at 6:30 P.M. CT. followed by an exciting, interesting program to help, entertain, and teach members about DX and amateur radio in general.

Club Officers: There are four elected officers (President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer) and three elected directors on the NADXC Board of Directors. The current roster of club officers and directors can be seen of the NADXC web site or in the "Longpath" newsletter, which is uploaded each month to the club website.

Website: The NADXC club maintains a website at <u>www.nadxc.org</u>. This site provides club information and activities throughout the year about a variety of subjects related to the club, DX, and amateur radio.
